For more than a century of doing business in California, Chevron continues to play an important role in Central California by creating jobs and driving economic development, providing financial and volunteer support for non-profit organizations, paying taxes that underwrite public services and working to deliver a lower carbon energy future.

In 2023, Chevron was directly responsible for 1,000 jobs for our employees and contractors and many more indirectly through the more than \$500 million spent to buy a wide variety of products and services from Central California businesses. Chevron contributed \$6.4 million to nonprofits and community groups in Fresno, Kern and Monterey counties to support education, economic development, environment, and other critical areas, helping improve the quality of life. As one of the top 10 property taxpayers in the counties where we operate, Chevron supports the local economies through tax payments.

We believe the future of energy is lower carbon. We are working to lower the carbon intensity of our operations — the amount of greenhouse gas per unit of energy produced. We are growing lower carbon businesses and plan to invest \$8 billion in lower carbon energy investments and \$2 billion in carbon reduction projects from 2021 through 2028. Central California has the right people, geology, and resources to be well positioned to play a meaningful role in a lower carbon energy economy.

Unfortunately, our ability to continue to deliver positive economic impact and community benefits in Central California is being challenged by California government policy choices. The high energy prices California consumers experience today are a direct result of more than 20 years of state regulations that have systematically increased taxes and constrained supply by discouraging investment in producing energy in California. We need to work together to deliver the affordable and reliable energy California needs to power its lifestyle and economy. California needs to take action to remove bureaucracy, encourage investment in the energy industry, and eliminate unnecessary burdens on businesses. That will help foster the collaboration that allows us to work together to deliver the affordable, reliable, and ever-cleaner energy that we need here in California.

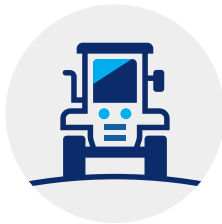

- We plan to use solar power, land, and water from our Central California business to produce electrolytic hydrogen.
- *Piloting innovative technology in partnership with Svante and Kiewit Energy Group Inc. at our Kern River oil field that may improve efficiency in the capture of CO₂ from emissions, and others that directly remove CO₂ from the atmosphere.

methane management

We believe addressing methane emissions has become a key part of being a responsible producer of oil, products and natural gas. Chevron's ambition is to be a leader in methane emissions performance. We have reduced our methane intensity by more than 60% across our upstream operations from 2016 to 2023.

We're testing emerging technology and collaborating with third parties to help find better ways to detect and measure methane emissions. We're also taking actions to improve the quality and transparency of methane emissions disclosures.

We believe that human ingenuity and the power of innovation can solve any challenges. In Central California, we aim to operate our fields in lower carbon intensity ways.

Following are just some of the initiatives we're working on to lower the carbon intensity of our operations:

solar

Utilizing renewable energy to power our operations and lower our carbon intensity with California's sunshine. Chevron and SunPower developed a 29-megawatt solar field at our Lost Hills oil field in Kern County, which began delivering electricity to our operations in April 2020.

solar to H2 project

We believe the use of lower carbon intensity hydrogen as a fuel source or feedstock can help reduce the amount of GHG emissions entering the atmosphere. Chevron has decades of knowledge and experience with hydrogen. We are pursuing commercial opportunities to develop technology, build infrastructure, connect supply chains and grow our hydrogen business to help deliver hydrogen at scale.

The project aims to create lower carbon energy by utilizing existing solar power, land, and produced water from Chevron's assets to produce electrolytic hydrogen. If successful, the project will help to produce hydrogen for the California market that could:

- create a pathway for commercial hydrogen production
- develop a supply source to support our Chevron retail stations
- establish commercial production for the transport market

managing our water usage

Oil production also produces water. For each barrel of oil recovered in California, there are approximately 15 barrels of water produced, commonly referred to as “produced water.”

We aim to drive efficient and responsible water use at our fields by reusing our produced water during oil operations. This practice preserves fresh water in the area to be used for other purposes.

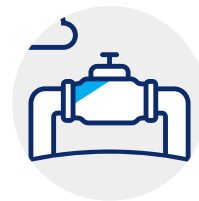
Water reuse programs are an important conservation strategy and environmental stewardship goal in water-constrained areas such as Central California.
